THE BATTLE OF SELBY

During the Civil War, the Battle of Selby occurred on the 11th April 1644. The town had previously been held by the Royalists, those who supported King Charles, but the battle resulted on the Parliamentarians taking the town. The Parliamentarians were also known as roundheads because of their hairstyles. Their victory at Selby left York, also known as the king's northern capital, vulnerable. It is believed that the Battle of Selby was the turning point in the war that lead to the parliamentarians victory. To read more click **here.**

WHO WON THE WAR?

The parliamentarians won the English Civil War. It was first thought that the war would end in 1947 after the surrender of the final Royalist stronghold, Harlech Castle in Wales. However, in 1948 after parliament troops had been left without pay, they staged a rebellion supporting the throne. After several battles, and the execution of Charles I, leaving his son Charles II to take the throne, the final battle of the war, the Battle of Worcester in 1951, was won by the parliamentarians forcing Charles II into exile.
